#### Summary:

The session kicked off with the opening remarks by the Chair, Mr. Tae Kyoon Kim, and the welcome remarks by the representative of Host Quezon City, Ms. Regina Samson. Then the

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Moderator, Mr. Kyong-yul Lee introduced all present participants and gave a brief overview of the meeting. The Chair reviewed the Meeting Memorandum of the preceding Executive Committee Meeting in 2017, and the Executive Committee unanimously adopted the current meeting agenda.

Mr. Kyong-yul Lee then took the floor to deliver the presentation of the WeGO Annual Report, after which the Executive Committee members finally proceeded to the discussions of the main meeting agenda.

#### Agenda 1: Approval of New Memberships & Withdrawals

The Executive Committee approved the full memberships of 15 new cities, 1 friendship organization, and 10 corporate companies. The new full members are enlisted below.

Additionally, the cities of Helsinki, Finland and Barcelona, Spain formally withdrew from WeGO.

#### Agenda 2: Regional Office Strategy and Updates to the Terms of Reference for the WeGO Regional Office

The Executive Committee members discussed the new regional office strategy. The WeGO Secretariat proposed modifying the subdivision of WeGO regional offices' boundaries to increase the number of high-quality regional programs and to help gain more WeGO members. The newly-proposed subdivisions include Africa, Europe, Eurasia, Southeast Asia, East Asia, Mediterranean, and Latin America. North America, Oceania and further subdivisions of Africa are other possibilities. Open calls for the prospective vacant regions of Africa, Europe, and Southeast Asia will be made in 2019. The establishment of the new regional offices, if any, will be tabled for approval of the Executive Committee at the next WeGO Executive Committee Meeting.

In accordance with the new statute amendments in 2017 that instituted a term of five years with the possibility of renewal and the newly proposed subdivisions, Chengdu was recommended to apply for the East Asia Regional Office, while the Ulyanovsk Region was recommended to apply for the Eurasia Regional Office.

### Agenda 3: Renewal of Regional Offices for Asia and Europe (East Asia & Eurasia)

After viewing the bidding presentations delivered by both the Asia and Europe Regional Offices, Chengdu and the Ulyanovsk Region, respectively, the Executive Committee officially approved the renewal of the regional offices with the updated names. Chengdu and the Ulvanovsk Region will thus serve as the WeGO East Asia Regional Office and WeGO Eurasia Regional Office, respectively, for the next term of 2018-2023. No bids were submitted by other WeGO members.

#### Agenda 4: Annual Assessment of Regional Offices for Latin America and the Mediterranean

After viewing the annual report presentations by Mexico City and Beyoğlu Municipality, the Executive Committee officially approved the continued operation of the WeGO Latin America Regional Office and the WeGO Mediterranean Regional Office, respectively.

#### Agenda 5: Review of WeGO Financial Report and Financial Strategy

The Executive Committee reviewed the report on the organization's revenue, including membership fees collected and contributions from President City Seoul, and its expenditures for the past year as well as the current balance. The organization's financial strategy was then discussed. Apart from involving the corporate sector in the organization's activities, the WeGO



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Secretariat first urged WeGO members to duly pay membership fees and asked for the regional offices' assistance in collecting membership fees in their respective regions. Second, a scheme of incentives and demerits was proposed: incentives include possible fee exemption on certain conditions, while demerits may allow possible loss of the non-paying member's voting rights or eligibility to be elected in WeGO's decision-making bodies. Finally, the secretariat stated the importance of expanding partnerships with stakeholders that are capable of supporting the secretariat in maximizing benefits for member cities in various ways, including financial aids.

A few comments and suggestions were made by the present Executive Committee members and observers. Seberang Perai stressed the need for closer collaboration with the private sector to provide services and benefits in member cities. Mexico City suggested introducing online educational courses on smart city topics with the possibility of certification for a certain fee. Chengdu shared their observations on how other international organizations run and advised to look into the opportunities of reaching out to foundations, which was later reiterated by observing Open Government Partnership, introduce franchise fees for hosting events or training centers, and initiate other sub-networks led by major cities to sponsor the networks' activities.

#### Agenda 6: Approval of Membership Fee Use for 2019

The Executive Committee reviewed the given expenditure proposal and approved the membership fee expenditure of 132,340 USD\* for 2019. Upon the secretariat's request, it also granted 10% flexibility in budget allocation between operational and program expenses. In addition to more high-quality programs for WeGO member cities, the secretariat proposed more financial support for WeGO members, including special funds available for regional offices, a global internship program, and operational expenses.

#### Agenda 7: Host City for Executive Committee Meeting 2019

The Executive Committee members took note of the ongoing call for bids for hosting the WeGO Executive Committee Meeting 2019, which had to be announced due to no official submissions during the initial round of the call for bids. They will review all bidding proposals received in a timely manner for an official selection by written consent. The Ulyanovsk Region also expressed on behalf of the City of Magas that the city was interested in hosting the meeting.

#### Agenda 8: Upcoming WeGO Activities for 2019

The Executive Committee members took note of the proposed plan of activities in 2019.

The session was concluded with short closing remarks by the Chairman and the Moderator and a group photo.

## AGENDA 1: Review of 2019 WeGO Secretariat Annual Report

Thanks to the increase in the number of staff at the Secretariat for 2018-2019, WeGO has been able to undertake more programs than usual. Most of these were conducted with the objective of expanding WeGO's memberships and partnerships in new regions of the world.

## AGENDA 3: Annual Assessment of WeGO Regional Offices & Call for New Regional Offices

#### **1. Annual Assessment of WeGO Regional Offices**

Pursuant to Article 10 of the Terms of Reference for the WeGO Regional Office, "At the Executive Meeting following the establishment of the Regional Office, the Executive Committee will conduct an annual assessment of the performance of each Regional Office in order to determine whether to allow it to continue its operations or dissolve the Regional Office".

All four (4) WeGO Regional Offices have thus submitted the WeGO Regional Office Annual Reports for the Executive Committee to review (see Annexes 1-4). The representatives of the regional offices are invited to present the Annual Report at the Executive Committee Meeting.

- WeGO East Asia Regional Office Chengdu, China
- WeGO Eurasia Regional Office Ulyanovsk Region, Russia
- WeGO Latin America Regional Office Mexico City, Mexico
- WeGO Mediterannean Regional Office Beyoğlu, Turkey

The Executive Committee will assess each Regional Office and its performance based on the following criteria:

- a) Pre-review of the Annual Report prior to the Executive Committee Meeting;
- b) Review of the guality of the presentation of the Annual Report by the Regional Office at the Executive Committee Meeting;
- c) Regional WeGO activities conducted in the respective region in the previous year;
- d) New WeGO members and partners acquired in the previous year in the respective region;
- e) Financial stability and prospects of the Regional Office for the next year;
- f) The Regional Office's relationship and cooperation with members in the region and the WeGO Secretariat; and
- g) The Regional Office and host city's commitment to promoting smart sustainable urban development in the city, country, and region of its location.

Pursuant to Article 13.6 of the WeGO Statutes, a Regional Office may be dissolved based on the results of the annual assessment to be conducted under Article 10 of the Terms of Reference, or in the event that the Executive Committee decides that the conduct, omission, or negligence of the Regional Office causes harm to the mission or purpose and/or reputation of the organization.

> The Executive Committee is invited to listen to the reports and approve the Regional Offices to continue operations.

#### 2. Call for New Regional Offices

 $\checkmark$ 

At the previous Executive Committee Meeting, the Executive Committee approved subdividing the jurisdiction of existing Regional Offices to increase the number of high-quality regional programs and to expand WeGO's membership.

A call for bids to host new Regional Offices in Africa, Europe, and Southeast Asia was made to WeGO members in April. Although the Secretariat approached several cities that showed interest in hosting a Regional Office in the past, they could not make a bid in time for approval of this Executive Committee Meeting. WeGO thus plans to relaunch the call for bids at the end of this year for approval at the Executive Committee Meeting in 2020.



The Executive Committee is invited to provide their suggestions and insights on possible cities that can serve as hosts of new Regional Offices.

In an aim to establish membership fee amounts appropriate for both startups and multinational corporations (MNCs) and thereby increase total revenue, the Secretariat proposes to reformulate the corporate membership category into three sub-categories--startups, SMEs, and MNCs. Membership fee amounts will take into account not only number of employees, but also years since establishment and annual revenue, as applicable. According to their payment of membership fees (which can be supplemented by voluntary donations), corporate members will be placed in one of four membership tiers--basic, silver, gold, and platinum--each with its own set of benefits.

## AGENDA 5: Approval of Dates of the 5th WeGO General Assembly

Makati City was elected as the host of the 5th WeGO General Assembly at the 4th WeGO General Assembly 2017, which was held from June 27-30, 2017 in Ulyanovsk Region, Russia.

#### 1. Dates and Themes of the 5th WeGO General Assembly 2020

Pursuant to Article 10.3 of the WeGO Statutes, the dates of the 5th WeGO General Assembly shall be determined by the Executive Committee in full consideration of the preferred dates of the host. WeGO and Makati City have jointly reviewed possible dates and agreed to holding the General Assembly within the first and second week of September 2020, upon approval of the Executive Committee. A more final date will be announced after checking the availability of venues, as well as important stakeholders. As WeGO was inaugurated during the 1st WeGO General Assembly on September 7, 2010, it is fitting that WeGO commemorates its 10th Anniversary at the 5th WeGO General Assembly at a date close to the inauguration date.

The WeGO Secretariat also seeks to begin discussions on the possible themes and topics for the 5th WeGO General Assembly at this Executive Committee Meeting. The theme of the General Assembly is usually determined by the WeGO Secretariat and the host city in full consultation with the Executive Committee. The dates, themes, and topics covered in previous General Assemblies are shown below and may be used as a reference:

While the mission of the organization remains relevant, the strategic plan needs to be substantially updated for the next term in order to maintain the organization's role in influencing smart city development in cities around the world and to secure the organization's global relevance to sustainability policies. Moreover, the updates in the strategic plan should enhance the organization's attractiveness to prospective members and strengthen its credibility and compatibility with other partners.

The Secretariat will thus be updating the Three-Year Strategic Plan for the term of 2020-2023 and presenting it to all WeGO members at the next General Assembly. The Secretariat will work to optimize its current activities, products, and services and develop new ones that seek to meet the most pressing needs of WeGO members in the transformation of cities into smart sustainable cities.

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## AGENDA 7: Information on Elections of President and Executive Committee Members & Appointment of Vice President Cities for Next Term of 2020-2023

#### 1. Election of President

#### Excerpts from the WeGO Statutes:

- Article 11.1: The Organization shall have one President City and Vice President Cities.
- number of votes shall become the President City.
- its candidacy two (2) months prior to the General Assembly where the election will be held, and the Secretariat shall subsequently announce the candidacy to all members at the earliest reasonable time prior to the General Assembly.
- Article 11.6: The elected President City and the appointed Vice President Cities shall serve a term of three (3) years and may be re-elected or re-appointed, respectively.
- Article 15.1: The President City of the Organization shall be primarily responsible for expenses for operating the Secretariat.
- Article 15.1: The President City of the Organization is primarily responsible for expenses of projects and programmes implemented for the purpose of promoting the Organization and its activities.

#### **CURRENT STATUS**

Seoul has taken the lead in founding and diligently managing WeGO as its President City since the organization's establishment in 2010, and has been re-elected three times at the previous General Assemblies (terms of 2012-2014, 2014-2017, and 2017-2020).

The Secretariat is located in the President City, which financially supports its operations.

#### **NEXT ELECTION**

Considering the constant growth of the organization's network and the diversification of its activities, the Secretariat seeks the Executive Committee's feedback with regard to the introduction of a "co-presidency," which will be proposed at the next General Assembly.

Whereas detailed guidelines have yet to be drafted, the term "co-presidency" implies that two or more President Cities share the responsibility for operating the Secretariat(s) and implementing the activities of the organization, in accordance with the Statutes.

Any local government member, including those currently serving on the Executive Committee, may submit its candidacy for the role of an additional President City. The Secretariat will notify all members of any candidates that have submitted their candidatures as a President City prior to the General Assembly.

The next election of the President Cities will take place at the next General Assembly.

\* Note: The relevant revisions in the WeGO Statutes will be made by the Secretariat and presented at the General Assembly, as detailed in Agenda 4.

#### 2. Appointment of Next Vice President Cities

Excerpts from the WeGO Statutes:

- Article 11.2: The Vice President Cities shall consist of an Executive Vice President City and not less than five (5) Vice President Cities.
- shall be appointed by the President City from among cities nominated by the Executive Committee. The appointment of the Executive Vice President City and Vice President Cities will be made in consideration of active participation in the Organization's activities, membership fee payment status, and equitable geographical distribution as much as possible.

#### **CURRENT STATUS**

The following local governments serve as the current Vice President Cities: Moscow, Ulyanovsk Region

• Article 11.3: The President City shall be elected at the General Assembly, and in the event of 2 or more candidates, the city receiving the largest

• Article 11.5: Any full member city that has fully paid membership fees and wishes to be elected as President shall notify the Secretariat in writing of

• Article 11.4: The next host city of the General Assembly will automatically be appointed as the Executive Vice President City and Vice President Cities



#### NEXT APPOINTMENT

Based on the criterion of equitable geographical distribution, the Secretariat proposes appointing at least one Vice President City for each of the six continents (excluding Antarctica): Africa, Asia, Oceania, Europe, North America, and South America.

-Each Vice President City will, in principle, represent the regional and local interests of the continent in which it is located. While the minimum number of Vice President Cities will be six, further Vice President Cities may be appointed to represent geographically subdivided interests of the continent in which it is located.

The President City or Cities will appoint or re-appoint Vice President Cities for the new term among the cities to be nominated by the Executive Committee. The current Vice President Cities may express their willingness to renew their terms and the Executive Committee may put forth nominations for other candidates at the Executive Committee Meetings prior to the next General Assembly or by written consent. The nominations will be taken into consideration by the President City or Cities and the Secretariat.

\* Note: The relevant revisions in the WeGO Statutes will be made by the Secretariat and presented at the General Assembly.

#### **3. Election of Executive Committee Members**

Excerpts from the WeGO Statutes:

- Article 12.1: The Organization shall have the Executive Committee comprising twenty (20) or less cities including the President City and Vice President Cities, excluding the Executive Vice President. The Executive Vice President, when automatically appointed in addition to a full twenty-member Executive Committee, may become the twenty-first member of the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee provides support for the projects and assists in the operation of the Organization.
- Article 12.4: Any member city may join the Executive Committee by notifying the Secretariat in writing of its candidacy two (2) months prior to the General Assembly. Members of the Executive Committee shall be elected by the General Assembly in consideration of active participation in the Organization's activities, membership fee payment status, and equitable geographical distribution as much as possible.
- Article 12.6: Members of the Executive Committee shall serve a term of three (3) years and may serve additional terms.

#### **CURRENT STATUS**

Only local government members are allowed to join the Executive Committee. The following twelve (12) cities are the current Executive Committee members:

Chengdu, Bucharest, Goyang, Hebron, Hong Kong, Khartoum State, Kigali, Makati, Nairobi, Pittsburgh, Seberang Perai, and Ulaanbaatar.

#### NEXT ELECTION

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In accordance with the proposed revisions to the WeGO Statutes, the composition of the Executive Committee will be amended to include one corporate member and one institutional member, for a more balanced representation and inclusivity of all categories of full members.

Members of the Executive Committee may express their willingness to renew their terms or put forth nominations for other candidates at the Executive Committee Meetings prior to the next General Assembly or by written consent. Any other members may submit their candidacies to the Secretariat two (2) months prior to the General Assembly.

The next election of the Executive Committee members will take place at the next General Assembly.

The Executive Committee is invited:

- to provide feedback with regard to the introduction of a "co-presidency."
- to self-nominate (current Vice Presidents only) and/or nominate candidates for Vice President.
- to self-nominate and/or nominate candidates for the Executive Committee.

The observers are invited:

to express interest in submitting their candidacies for the Executive Committee.

## AGENDA 8: The 4th WeGO Smart Sustainable City Awards

#### **CURRENT STATUS**

The WeGO Smart Sustainable City Awards (previously, WeGO Awards) were established in 2011 to recognize outstanding e-government practices of local governments around the world. The activity further aims to promote smart initiatives that use information and communication technologies (ICTs) to improve the quality of life of citizens. The awards are traditionally held in the same year as the WeGO General Assembly, and next year marks the 4th WeGO Smart Sustainable City Awards and will take place in Makati City, Philippines.

The 1st WeGO Awards were officially launched and received great international attention at the 1st WeGO Awards Ceremony held at the 2nd WeGO General Assembly in Barcelona, Spain. Building on such achievements, the Awards enjoyed even wider recognition at the 2nd WeGO Awards Ceremony held at the 3rd WeGO General Assembly in Chengdu, China.

In 2016, in line with the adoption of the updated WeGO name, mission, and Three-Year Strategic Plan, as well as taking into account the fast-changing ICT environment and recognizing the ambiguous and outdated nomenclature of the previous WeGO Awards, the Executive Committee approved renaming the WeGO Awards to the WeGO Smart Sustainable City Awards.

#### **NEXT AWARDS**

The Terms of Reference of the WeGO Smart Sustainable City Awards may be amended upon approval by the Executive Committee. The proposed amendments are presented to the Executive Committee for its approval. See the updated Terms of Reference of the WeGO Smart Sustainable City Awards in Annex 5.

#### Article 4 (Categories)

The Secretariat proposes the following amendments to the award categories to reflect the latest smart city trends and developments and avoid overlap between categories:

- Management)
- c) Open and Inclusive City Category (Citizen Participation, Open Data and Privacy, Transparency, Bridging the Digital Divide, Participatory Budgeting, Living Labs, Crowdsourcing)
- d) Mobility Category (Efficient Transport, Intelligent Transport Systems, Mixed-Modal Access, Integrated ICT Infrastructure, Parking)
- e) Safe City Category (Security, Emergency Response, Gas and Fire Detection, Infrastructure Management, Disaster Response)
- f) Emerging Technology Category (Latest ICT innovations such as AI, Drones, Blockchain, Virtual and Augmented Reality, Edge Computing)

The previous award categories are shown below as a reference:

- a) Open City Category (Administrative Transparency, Open Data)
- b) Digital Inclusion Category (Citizen Engagement, Civic Participation, Digital Divide)
- c) Innovative Sustainable City Category (Addressing SDGs, Impact on Sustainability)
- d) e-Government Services Category (Quality, Effectiveness of Public Services)
- e) Cooperative City Category (Internal/External Integration of City, Whole-of-Government approach, city-to-city cooperation, inter-departmental relationships, central vs. local etc.)

#### Article 8 (Judging Panel)

The Secretariat proposes the following amendments to the judging panel for more accurate evaluation: a) The judging panel will consist of ten (10) experts chosen by the WeGO Secretariat, with due consideration to needed expertise and
